Dear Chair Richards and Members of the Planning Board:

Subdivision approval was granted for the "Martinelli Subdivision" in 2012 with the condition that the applicant shall return to the Planning Board for site plan and architectural approval once the decision is made to develop the lots. As such, the applicant is currently seeking those approvals.

As part of the subdivision approval process, the SEQR process was completed and all possible environmental impacts were investigated and adequately addressed. Nevertheless, the applicant prepared and submitted updated Short Form EAF's in 2015 to accompany the site plan approval applications.

At the February 25, 2015 Planning Board meeting, concern was raised by Board members regarding Question #15 on the Short EAF which states the site contains species of animal, or associated habitats listed by the State or Federal government as threatened or endangered. The answer to this question was automatically inserted on the PDF generated by the EAF Mapper. While the site is located in an area which is generally designated as having the potential to support endangered species, it is the purpose of the letter to provide a supplemental explanation as to why this project will not impact any listed endangered or threatened animals.

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Based on the designation of the project area, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) suggests investigating further using the Environmental Mapper and New York State Nature Explorer. The outputs from both of these mapping sites are enclosed herewith. Although the sites are located within the "rare plants and rare animal" boundary, there are no records provided with site-specific species located on the 0.72 acre property in question.

Using the NYSDEC's mapping resources, numerous site visits and our firm's past experience with projects in the surrounding area, we can state that there are no threatened or endangered animals located on the proposed site of 1 Roosa Lane and 64 Hawkes Avenue.




