1 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** So here we go. Good evening and
2 welcome everyone to the town board of the Town of Ossining regular
3 meeting for May 26 2020. Please rise and join me for the Pledge of
4 Allegiance and remain standing for a moment of silence and recognition of
5 Memorial Day.

6 **ALL:** I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to
7 the Republic for which it stands, one nation, under God, indivisible, with
8 liberty and justice for all.

9 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** I realized, as I've been getting ready
10 for these meetings I haven't been wearing my town pin so I want to make
11 sure I did that, especially as we are - and I forgot to stay standing for this
12 moment of silence. That's exactly what I wanted everybody to do, but I
13 wanted to just let everybody know that this year we are unable to gather
14 together as we usually do to recognize the members of our community who
15 have given everything and service to our country. I would like to take a
16 moment now to remember the service men and women. We have lost the
17 battle and also in their return home, including those who have waged wars
18 against PTSD chronic illnesses and yes, even COVID. Memorial Day is
19 always a meaningful time to pause and remember the bravest among us
20 and perhaps even moreso during this incredibly difficult time. So please join
21 me in a moment of silence.

22 **[MOMENT OF SILENCE]**

23 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Thank you.

24 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** It really was bittersweet not being
25 able to be there, together with everybody this weekend. So we thank our
26 legions and our central committee organized veterans, for having held
27 ceremonies with smaller groups and for placing wreathes, on behalf of the
28 Town. I am going - I guess we were going to start with our roll call. Do we
29 have... Yes, we do.

30 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** So Councilmember Feldman.

31 **COUNCILMEMBER ELIZABETH FELDMAN:** Present.

32 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Councilmember Shaw?

33 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW:** Present.

34 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Councilmember Meyer?

35 **COUNCILMEMBER GREGORY MEYER:** Present.

36 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Councilmember Wilcher?

37 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER:** Present.

38 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** And Supervisor Levenberg? Here I
39 am.

40 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay, just make sure that I am in
41 right place the right time. I think we're going to announcements next, it's
42 very hard for me to manage all these things without my written content, is
43 that correct announcements are next?

45 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay, so this weekend we heard
46 from Governor Cuomo that the mid-Hudson region, including Westchester
47 Rockland, Putnam, Dutchess, Sullivan, Ulster, and Orange Counties have
48 met the criteria for phase one reopening as of today Tuesday, May 26
49 2020. This means that only Phase One businesses, specifically those in the
50 construction, agriculture, forestry, fishing, hunting, contactless retail,
51 manufacturing, and wholesale trade industries are eligible to reopen.
52 Businesses in these industries that are seeking to reopen must first
53 develop a written business safety plan, which hopefully they've been
54 working on. And must read and affirm industry specific guidelines, the

55 business safety plan must be conspicuously posted at the businesses
56 premises and available upon inspection by the New York State Department
57 of Health, or local safety and health authorities. Template safety plans and
58 guidelines are available on the New York forward website at forward.ny.gov

59 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** But you can't just print out the
60 templates and reopen there are specific questions that each business
61 owner must consider carefully.

62 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** And answer regarding practices that
63 they will put in place when open to protect employees, visitors, and
64 customers from exposure to COVID-19. And make sure that we do not
65 exacerbate the spread by not paying attention to these very important
66 protocols. Please do not mistake this Phase One reopening as the
67 floodgates opening for all businesses and everything goes back to normal.
68 Business is not included within the specific industries listed for phase one
69 are not yet eligible for reopening and that's plenty. There's plenty of
70 businesses. As part of New York forward Governor Cuomo has indicated
71 that there will be at least two weeks between phases to sufficiently evaluate
72 how the phase reopening will impact the number of cases in each region.

73 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** So then if they start seeing numbers
74 spiking in any of the regions, then we're going to have to go backwards.
75 Phase Two will bring us professional services more retail administrative
76 support hair salons. Whoo hoo. We can finally get those haircuts we've all
77 been waiting for, and real estate slash rental and leasing.

78 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Phase three will include restaurants
79 and food service and finally phase four will bring back the arts,
80 entertainment, recreation and of course importantly education. So if you fit
81 into any of these categories. You are not eligible for reopening if you're in
82 any of the two, three and four categories. The virus is not going away.
83 Instead, our social distancing ever - ever efforts have gone a long way to
84 flatten the curve. And we now have a sufficient handle on the infrastructure
85 necessary, including the number of hospital beds ICU beds and a robust
86 contact tracing effort to better control positive cases of COVID-19.

87 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** So for the rest of us that are not in
88 construction agriculture, forestry, fishing, hunting, curbside retail,
89 manufacturing or wholesale trade industries. All existing restrictions of New

90 York PAUSE for remain in effect other non-essential businesses remain
91 closed non-essential employees shall continue to work remotely and we
92 must remain vigilant in our efforts to socially distance and wear masks went
93 out in public.

94 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Of course we did just find out that the
95 courts are permitted to bring full staff back in to work behind the scenes.
96 But no, not open to the public, yet so stay tuned for more information about
97 our courts. If you do have any questions regarding this news that you
98 cannot find on the New York forward website, please feel free to reach out
99 to my office at 914-762-6001. If you have questions that are specific to
100 construction in the unincorporated town of rationing, you should reach our
101 building department at 914-762-8419 or their respective departments in the
102 Villages of Ossining and Briarcliff.

103 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** We also continue to have available
104 some cloth facemasks for distribution to local businesses, but please get
105 them while we still have them. You can submit your request and schedule a
106 time slot for contactless pickup by calling Carina Scorcia here in my office
107 at 762-6002. We have now been told, we can distribute some of these cloth
108 mass to members of the public, which we will be doing via the weekly
109 Feeding Westchester food distributions. Our stock remains limited, so we're
110 still unable to distribute outside of these categories.

111 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** But we have some resources on our
112 website to help you make your own masks and we have introduced
113 hashtag mask - mask Mondays, please share your selfies with your
114 handmade creations via Instagram or Facebook. We would love to see
115 them.

116 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** As we begin this transition to our new
117 normal. We have to reevaluate many of the public events and gatherings.
118 We have all come to enjoy so much. We have discussed at the past few
119 work sessions plans to reimagine the Independence Day fireworks and
120 summer concert series at Lewis Engel Park through the lens of social
121 distancing. I'm sorry to announce tonight that we will be canceling or
122 Independence Day fireworks celebration. That was scary. Given what you
123 know about New York Forward. I think that that's fireworks happening now
124 in response to my comment, given what we know now about here forward

125 it's highly unlikely that will be able to safely gather for our fireworks display
126 this July. We are also following to with our Westchester County colleagues
127 who recently announced that they would be canceling both county
128 sponsored Independence Day celebrations.

129 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** That being said, we are happy to
130 share that we have been working closely with our friends at the Greater
131 Ossining Chamber of Commerce. Mike and Miriam Risko of Mike Risko of
132 music and Sing Sing Kill Brewery to schedule, at least for virtual concerts
133 on Fridays in July. There is still a bit of coordinating to do but we hope to
134 feature some local musicians and find ways to support local business
135 owners at the same time by encouraging audience members to grab some
136 local takeout while they enjoy a show on Friday nights will be sharing more
137 details in the coming weeks. So stay tuned.

138 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** We also are looking at our parks and
139 public spaces and are reminded that everyone needs to continue to respect
140 those areas that are still closed. Such as our playground equipment, where
141 we hear people continue to tear down the caution tape which we put up
142 weekly to remind people that these areas are closed. Why are they closed?
143 Because we don't believe that we have protocols in place that are where
144 we were able to keep them safe. So please respect the areas that are
145 closed.

146 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** And I wanted to let everyone know
147 something that I had shared in my update on Friday, and that is that New
148 York State, at the request of our State Assembly woman and State Senator
149 Pete Harckham as well as some of the local officials that border the area –
150 the unique area – the unique area has been closed for the season. As sad
151 as it is for us to have to close public spaces, especially those that offer a
152 reprieve from the heat, over the last several years as community groups
153 work in partnership with multiple bordering municipalities we know that the
154 state forrest property along the river has become completely overcrowded
155 and very difficult to control.

156 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Many of us who have worked at
157 putting appropriate restrictions in place to protect the area while making it a
158 safe place for the public to enjoy were very concerned, now more than ever
159 that this area would have been a breeding ground for spread with the

160 increased popularity it has seen. So we're very grateful that the Governor's
161 Office responded and decided to close this area for this season.

162 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** We hope that with other efforts in
163 place next year it will be up and running again with an active stewardship
164 program in place. Meanwhile, please help share with others, that it is
165 closed through Labor Day 2020.

166 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** The School District Budget and
167 Board Of Education elections for both the Ossining and Briarcliff school
168 districts will be conducted entirely via absentee ballot this year. All qualified
169 voters within the Ossining and Briarcliff school districts will be receiving a
170 ballot directly via mail probably this week. No need to apply this time for
171 that ballot, you get the ballot versus an application for the ballot.

172 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** You must complete your ballot, it
173 must be received in the mail by 5pm on Tuesday, June night, no one
174 person voting or voter registration will be allowed. Please remember that if
175 you live in the Ossining School District you will also be asked to vote on the
176 Ossining Public Library Budget and Trustee elections for library and school
177 district as well. Both school districts and the Ossining Library have
178 additional information regarding the proposed budgets and board
179 candidates on their websites. If you have any questions you can reach the

182 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Finally of course it would not be my
183 Announcements if I were not to mention the census. Yes, it's true. We still
184 have a long way to go to get to 100%. And we need everybody to make
185 sure that they do their part to make sure they - their neighbors and friends -
186 are all counted. That way, we have a much better chance of getting the
187 funding that we deserve based on the number of people that live here.
188 Memorial Day reminds us that the data from the census helps support
189 veteran and military programs shaping the future of this important
190 community in our country. And of course it also helps our schools. So
191 please fill out your census today at 2020census.gov. The simple
192 questionnaire will go a long way to help our entire community.

193 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Do any of my board colleagues have
194 other announcements.

195 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** We'll see... I'm not seeing any
196 hands. Yeah, if you want to just wave your hand if you do have anything
197 and seeing... and hearing none. We will continue on with our departmental
198 report this evening. We are very pleased to be hosting when our favorite
199 departments. Okay, don't get jealous other departments, we love you also
200 our Ossining Police Department and we're joined by our Ossining Police
201 Chief Kevin Sylvester for a report from him.

202 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Chief you and your amazing team
203 have been working tirelessly day in and day out during this crisis to ensure
204 that our community remain safe. So we thank you so much for all that you
205 and your end your department has been doing. And thank you, of course,
206 also for joining us tonight.

207 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** Good evening, Madam Supervisor
208 members of the Council, ordinarily when I come, I like to give an update on
209 all of the different things happening around the police department,
210 obviously, with coronavirus and all that comes with that it's- it's a sort of
211 unique time our operational tempo has been changed over the past two
212 months or so, we've had reduced staffing numbers in the town remain the
213 same, our minimum staff each stays the same but we've reduced the
214 number of people that are coming into work much the same as other offices
215 have in order to prevent the spread of disease, which has worked out to our
216 advantage. And that we've had nobody that's tested positive within the
217 department. So that's, that's a big deal for us it's helped us to keep our
218 staffing levels up sufficient that we don't go into crisis mode.

219 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** Some different things we've been
220 working on while this is going on: birthday parades. A good deal of our time
221 has been taken up with going house to house celebrating people's birthday,
222 which is just what every cop signs up for, um, you know, just to be aware,
223 we're doing as many of those as possible. We get an overwhelming
224 number of requests and we're trying to hit as many as we can.

225 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** For those that we can we do for
226 those that we can't we always let people know it's impossible for us predict
227 what call volume is going to be tomorrow. So working together with OVAC
228 we've had many of those as we can. As you'd mentioned the Unique Area
229 has been closed down and we're thankful for the partnership we get with

230 New York State and Westchester County this year to sort of take the
231 pressure off of us during this time because while we're trying to keep the
232 parks closed that certainly presented a challenge.

233 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** In terms of our parks, our officers
234 continue to patrol those you know there's a lot of questions about how
235 we're handling social distancing and all the regulations in the park. You
236 know, the reality is, is that our strategy is discretion, our staff has been
237 charged with - with going out and speaking to people and explaining and
238 influencing and doing the best we can to get people to comply, rather than
239 have to write summonses. I'm not aware of any agency in Westchester
240 County so far that's actually written tickets for violations of social distancing
241 rules and associated with an association with the Executive Orders. But I
242 can tell you that we certainly stop a number of people each day for
243 everything from being without masks when to close, to playing in the park
244 some places they're not supposed to be. It's challenging, but it's certainly
245 something that we continue to do and you know it's - it's a worthy cause.

246 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** June 1 we are going to be returning
247 our full staff to work. As our staff is all essential but without cars on the road
248 there wasn't as much use for parking enforcement. So those are the folks
249 are some of them have been assigned to home for a while. On June 1 our
250 full staff will be coming back at which point, you'll start to see more of our
251 bike patrols and our foot posts and traffic posts and parking enforcement
252 and all of those kind of things coming back. So long before everybody else.
253 I think gets back to full speed. We're looking for a return to normalcy to be
254 prepared for more people on the road.

255 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** With that in mind, one of the things
256 that we're going to be doing is increased traffic enforcement, we're going to
257 be talking about that across all of our all of our social media channels over
258 the next couple of days, next couple of weeks, quite a few people while
259 driving have figured out that with less cars on the road - or have decided
260 with less cars on the road - they think that that means the open road
261 belongs to them. And we've certainly seen an increase in speeding so
262 we're going to be sending a strong message to those folks to make sure
263 that everybody understands. Obviously our main goal is voluntary
264 compliance where that does not work enforcement comes in. But certainly

265 we need to slow things down before everybody gets back on the road and
266 things get back to normal because we want to prevent accidents.

267 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** Our department is continued with
268 training. We've already completed for this year, right before this happened,
269 we'd finished with all of our first aid and Infectious Disease Control and last
270 week we finished our first have firearms qualification. A couple of weeks
271 back, you may have seen that we completed the – or we assisted with the
272 Ossining school district teacher parade.

273 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** And we're excited to be helping with
274 graduation and a senior parade. So, June 8, 9, and 10 if you live around
275 Ossining High School expect some traffic there. They're - They have a
276 whole program for graduation, where they're going to do in person
277 graduation stage out over three days. And that is much more conversation
278 for Dr. Sanchez and information for him to share. I don't want to steal his
279 thunder on that. But you can expect some traffic on those days will be there
280 assisting with that. And also we have planned for June 19 around the town
281 and village to have a Senior Parade and I'm not exactly sure what that's
282 going to look like we're still in planning phases for that. We want to make
283 sure that to safe as possible. With a bunch of seniors driving their cars, but
284 we intend to help and make that happen because we certainly are
285 understanding and empathetic, that the Senior Class of 2020 is not getting
286 their - their due from everybody else. So we're looking forward to that.

287 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** And hopefully with next quarter.
288 We're going to have a little bit more action and some - some more
289 normalcy back here. So I look forward to... We're not going to have our
290 regular summer calendar this year, but we are working with the school
291 district to try and find as many ways to connect with kids as possible. So
292 we've got some plans in the work, but nothing solidified yet. I don't think
293 block parties are going to be back for quite some time, but uh we're looking
294 forward to finding a way to still connect with people and make those
295 connections.

296 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Wonderful. Oh well, again, thank you
297 so much, because we know that it's a troubling time right now. And yes, I
298 think we actually put up - I think the signs are up now on North State Road
299 for the new lowered speed limit. Have you - I didn't give you a heads up, so

300 don't expect you to actually know any numbers, but I'm just wondering if
301 that's going to be an interesting place to enforce speeding restrictions or,
302 you know, speeding period.

303 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** Yeah so, our plan for a lot of that.
304 Sure. So for North State Road where the speed changed. We're not going
305 to be doing a whole lot of enforcement just yet, as we roll into that has
306 we're still working on our officers on how we're going to be interacting with
307 people on traffic stops. Certainly we're still doing traffic stops, I think I do
308 five a week myself. One of the things that we do when we have a change in
309 traffic ordinances, is that we'll go out, we'll make traffic stops and the first
310 few days, a few weeks are a whole lot of warnings.

311 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** The reality is, is that most people
312 won't notice those signs when they're driving past and, you know, the goal
313 here is not to harm people but again it's voluntary compliance and we want
314 people to be driving under the speed limit. So we're going to do a lot of
315 talking about that once we start a formalized program to introduce people
316 to that. There'll be a bunch of warnings and then they'll be allowed clear
317 message that the warnings are up the tickets are going to start getting
318 issued so, you know, not a terribly difficult task. But, uh, you know, one that
319 we're going to wait to be able to make a little bit more of a formal
320 announcement about once we've set everybody free for traffic
321 enforcement.

322 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Great. And then my other two
323 questions, or just that we've been getting most of the, you know, most of
324 the complaints we get our quality of life issues. May 30 our gas leaf blower
325 ban goes into effect. And I know we've been getting a lot of calls about, you
326 know, noise and leaf blowers and gas leaf blowers. We're going to try to do
327 our best just to let some of the local shops that service these machines
328 remind them to remind their businesses. So just wanted to, you know, I
329 assume you're getting complaints about that as well. Just want us to make
330 sure that everybody is aware that this this week that goes into effect.

331 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** Yeah. So generally what we'll do is
332 on - on the day that goes into effect will do a public message that day and
333 say 'this is your last day.' Our staff gets updates on ordinances daily and
334 weekly through our briefings and roll call. Um, you know, I don't know how

335 many homeowners, really, to be honest, get their leaf blower service, but
336 it's definitely a good way to connect with the landscapers -

337 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** That's what I meant, the landscapers.

338 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** You know, like I said, like, like
339 everything else we drive around looking for it in the first few days when it's
340 you know when it's the new change over because a lot of people won't be
341 willfully violating. It's just a, you know, a lot of people may not realize that's
342 the date and there's definitely some confusion between the Town and
343 Village where those two differ sometimes. No problem. We're on it. We
344 haven't heard many complaints about that yet. Most of the noise complaints
345 we've gotten the last couple of weeks have been loud music and people
346 out in their yard and we're helping neighbors to get along with one another.
347 But, uh, so far so - so good.

348 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** And then another - another complaint
349 that flashed by me, but it was it was a Village complaint, but I'm just
350 wondering again, if you're seeing more of these. With somebody who
351 complains [to] the county about a local restaurant being open or is that
352 anything that you've been going to hearing about going around giving
353 mornings if businesses aren't complying and as we're in Phase One. Now, I
354 assume most of that is going to be for our building department to contend
355 with, but you know, I think you probably certainly allowed to go in and talk
356 to businesses, if they're not complying with certain protocols.

357 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** You know, we're certainly checking
358 on these things regularly. You know, a lot of complaints that we're getting
359 our people who drive by or pass by and see something that's momentary. A
360 lot of the complaints of social gathering that we respond to tend to be
361 families where people may not realize that people are from the same
362 household and we're not really necessarily separating those folks if their
363 family and they're out in public. With the restaurants. I know that our staff
364 was asked over the last couple days to go down and check on the
365 boathouse. Or rather, that one came in today. So they're down checking
366 tonight. I'm... In general, we're really not finding a lot of the complaints that
367 are coming in, you know... With the restaurants a lot of them are people
368 that are waiting to pick up food and they just end up with a line outside and

369 people by human nature crowd because lines make people anxious and
370 that's a lot of what we see.

371 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** So, you know, it - we're not seeing a
372 whole lot of people that are willfully violating laws. We're seeing human
373 nature at play. And people that are just being themselves and doing the
374 things that they do every day and you know, if you're waiting for your food
375 outside of place like the boathouse where the patio and then the parking
376 lot. People tend to move in away from the cars and eventually conversation
377 start with friends they haven't seen in a while. And that's how it goes. It
378 really hasn't - most people that we've interacted with has been quite
379 cooperative

380 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Sure. Awesome. So I just want to ask
381 any more colleagues. If anybody has any questions for the Chief.

382 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Hearing and seeing none, although I
383 will say that some of you are frozen - maybe all of you are frozen. If you do
384 have anything to say. Could you actually raise your hand, just so I know or..
385 I don't see anybody. Everybody's frozen. Okay. I don't know why but okay
386 you can all hear me. So thank you so much, Chief. I think that's that were
387 great. And once again, please give a big shout out from our town board to
388 your entire staff. We are so appreciative of everybody and everything that
389 everybody's doing and just being around the clock for our community. At
390 this time, do whatever you can to make it a more positive experience,
391 which is what you're so good at and, you know, just being watching having
392 our backs every day. We're very appreciative.

393 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** Thank you for that.

394 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Thank you so much.

395 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay, so, and that was nobody had
396 anybody have any questions, and I just missed because everybody's
397 frozen for a minute and now they're not

398 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER:** Just, just, just a thank you.

399 **POLICE CHIEF KEVIN SYLVESTER:** Appreciate that.

400 **COUNCILMEMBER ELIZABETH FEDMAN:** Yeah, thanks. It's very nice to
401 hear that none of the officers have come down with it. That's great to hear.

402 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Yes testament to you, Chief.

403 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** All right. Well, with that, thank you
404 again chief and we are going to move into liaison reports are there any
405 from my colleagues?

406 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** No. No? Okay. If, for whatever
407 reason, I don't see that you want to speak and just if you just - do you guys
408 all see if you click on participants and you can raise your hand? If you want
409 to just do that in a little sidebar, just do that in case or just wave like that.
410 Just in case I don't, we don't catch you soon enough. So now I would ask if
411 there is any comment from the public on any of the agenda items? Agenda
412 items only. And Hearing none, we will move into our - the rest of our
413 resolutions.

414 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Our Deputy Clerk Martha Quituisaca
415 please.

416 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Approval of Minutes Regular
417 Meeting May 12 2020 resolved that Town Board of the Town of Ossining
418 hereby approves the April 20, 2020 minutes of the regular meeting, as
419 presented. I'm sorry, I should say May 12th, my apologies.

420 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** May 12th. Okay, so do I have a
421 Motion?

422 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER AND COUNCILMEMBER**
423 **JACKIE SHAW:** So moved.

424 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay. And is there a second?

425 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER:** Second.

426 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** All those in favor?

427 **ALL:** Aye.

428 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Anybody opposed?

429 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay.

430 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Okay. Approval of voucher
431 detail report. Resolved that the Town Board of the Town of Ossining hereby

432 approves the bachelor detail report dated May 26, 2020 and the amount of
433 \$357,830 and 95 cents.

434 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Do I have a motion?

435 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER:** So moved.

436 **COUNCILMEMBER LIZ FELDMAN:** Second.

437 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Any questions? Discussion?

438 **COUNCILMEMBER ELIZABETH FEDMAN:** The truck had to get paid for
439 now, huh?

440 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Yes, but we borrowed for that so...

441 **COUNCILMEMBER ELIZABETH FEDMAN:** I know.

442 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** I mean, not that. It's great. But yes,
443 we it. We've been waiting a year and a half, and finally of course the truck
444 came in now. But yes, the good news is that we - we have plans for that
445 well in advance, so that's - that's the only good news. I mean, the good
446 news is that we are going to will be well positioned for excellent plowing in
447 uh, and uh - making brine and using it and spreading it in the winter. It's
448 hard to imagine right now. But it will it will serve us well and our trucks have
449 a useful life and they have exceeded it. And when they do, unfortunately,
450 we have to keep up with the - keep up with that otherwise, we're not in a
451 position to make sure that our town roads are safe. So we want to make
452 sure we can do that.

453 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay. So, all those in favor?

454 **ALL:** Aye.

455 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Anybody opposed?

456 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Contract with
457 SeamlessDocs.com to provide services to the Clerk's Office. Resolved that
458 the [UNCLEAR] of the Council to the Town, the Supervisor [is] authorized
459 to sign the May 8, 2020 proposal with SeamlessDoc.com, 30 Dandom
460 Street, New York, New York 113 for SeamlessDocs.com, to provide
461 software and services to the Clerk's Office which also serves as a Village of
462 Ossining's Clerk per an intermunicipal agreement for a three year

463 subscription commencing on or about June 1, 2024 \$11,595 year one,
464 \$10,000 year two and \$10,000 for year three or the cost to be shared
465 equally between the Town of Ossining and the Village of Ossining.

466 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Do I have a motion?

467 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW:** So moved.

468 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** And the –

469 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER:** Second.

470 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** - second? So, from time to time –

471 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER:** Second.

472 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Thank you. Got it. So, from time to
473 time our Clerk will - I'm sorry, I'm actually on the wrong on the resolution –
474 our - a few weeks back our Town Clerk Sue Donnelly presented to the
475 Town Board a proposal to engage Seamless Docs to allow for remote
476 services through our Clerk's Office. After a thorough review thanks to
477 Counsel Tama Donna, we are ready to sign this contract and begin the
478 process of bringing many more services online. I know that our Clerk,
479 Suzanne Donnelly, had made this one of her goals was to bring – make,
480 make her office more efficient and [it] couldn't have come at a better time.
481 Obviously, we need to do as much as we can, online to reduce the amount
482 of time we have to actually have contact, in-person contact with people at
483 this time. So this worked out very well. That it just kind of said it just worked
484 right into her goals. So we're excited that the - we've gotten the contract to
485 a good place and that the Village is also anxious to do this at the same time
486 so that we can reduce our expenses overall to both Town and Village. And
487 that's good for all our taxpayers.

488 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** So in other words, if we hadn't just do
489 this on our own we would've had to pay the full \$11,000 but by sharing it
490 with the Village, we can actually reduce the cost by half. All those in favor?

491 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG, COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW,**
492 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER, COUNCILMEMBER LIZ**
493 **FELDMAN, COUNCILMEMBER GREG MEYER:** Aye.

494 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Anybody opposed?

495 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Tax payment plan – oh.

496 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Was there any [UNCLEAR]

497 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** No. Oh okay. Tax payment
498 plan 159-161 Croton Avenue whereas the Town of Ossining is required to
499 collect Town, County, and school taxes for the municipality; the onus on the
500 Town to me, call the County School District for any on collect taxes; and,

501 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas the Receiver of
502 Taxes has been approached by property owner requesting a short time
503 payment plan for the property at 159 through 161 Croton Avenue tax parcel
504 designation ID number 89.16-3-85.1; and,

505 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas the Town Board
506 pursuant to Article 5 of the Ossining Town Code authorize this Section
507 1184 of the New York real property tax law before entry the final judgment
508 new withdraw parcel for which payment of the real property taxes is
509 delinquent and from a foreclosure proceeding and entrance an installment
510 plan for payment of all delinquent taxes as well as interest and penalties
511 and those occasionally grant such a plan has a discretion to accept or
512 reject any proposal by residential property owner providing the owner
513 means the eligibility requirements set forth in Section 180.17 of the Town
514 Code. And the payment plan confirms with requirements are such a
515 repayment plan assess forth in section one at dash 180-1 of the Town
516 Code.

517 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Now, this would be resolved
518 that the Town Board of the Town of Ossining hereby grants the
519 aforementioned payment plan which terms complying with the Town Code
520 to this property owner who has been determined to be eligible, but the
521 understanding that this is no proceed and going forward for this or any
522 other property in the future.

523 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Do I have a motion?

524 **COUNCILMEMBER LIZ FELDMAN:** So moved.

525 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER:** Second.

526 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** So, from time to time our Tax
527 Receiver will receive a request from a property owner to enter into a

528 payment plan for uncollected taxes. Recently received a request from the
529 property owners at 159 - 161 Croton Avenue and 14 Fuller Road both
530 property owners qualify under the current local and state regulations
531 governing payment plans so we will be voting on both requests tonight. Is
532 there any discussion [on] the first one of these payment plans?

533 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Hearing none, all those in favor?

534 **COUNCILMEMBER LIZ FELDMAN, COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN**
535 **WILCHER, COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW, COUNCILMEMBER**
536 **GREG MEYER, SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Aye.

537 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Anybody opposed? Any abstentions?
538 Thank you.

539 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Okay. Tax payment plan 14
540 Fuller Road. Whereas the Town of Ossining is required to collect
541 Town/County and school taxes for the municipality with the onus on the
542 town to make whole the County and the School District for any uncollected
543 taxes; and

544 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas the Receiver of
545 Taxes has been approached by property owner requesting a short-term
546 payment plan for the property of 14 Fuller Road tax parcel designation ID
547 number 97.11-2 -25; and

548 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Now, therefore, be it resolved
549 that the Town Board of the Town of Ossining hereby grants the
550 aforementioned payment plan, which terms comply with the Town Code, to
551 this property owner who has been determined to be eligible with the
552 understanding that this sets no precedent going forward for this or any
553 other property in the future.

554 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Motion?

555 **COUNCILMEMBER ELIZABETH FEDMAN:** So moved.

556 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW:** [UNCLEAR]

557 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Second. All those in favor?

558 **ALL:** Aye.

559 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Any opposed? Any abstentions?
560 Awesome. Thank you.

561 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Okay. Amending payment plan
562 for delinquent taxes for 108 Croton Avenue. Whereas due to the COVID-19
563 epidemics and the related restrictions on business operations, many
564 taxpayers are suffering financial hardships due to the loss of employment
565 and other income; and

566 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas as a result of the
567 federal and New York State governments have extended the deadline for
568 finally income tax returns, and if applicable extending the outstanding
569 amount owed to July 15 2020, and the New York State in Westchester
570 County governments have eliminated or substantially reduced the penalties
571 on late payment of Town and County real property taxes for payments
572 received by July 15 2020; and

573 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas pursuant to real
574 property tax law statute 1184 in Town Code chapter one at Article five, the
575 Town is authorized to enter into agreements the taxpayer – taxpayer –
576 taxpayers delinquent on their real property taxes and requires monthly
577 payments in order to satisfy the outstanding real property tax obligations;
578 and

579 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas the Town Board
580 previously authorized the Town Receiver of Taxes to encourage a payment
581 plan with the owner of 108 Croton Avenue in Ossining New York (the
582 property) for the payment of delinquent real property taxes; and

583 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas, the property owner
584 con – con – contacted the Town Receiver of Taxes and advised they're
585 suffering financial hardship due to [the] COVID-19 pandemic and requested
586 a modification of the payment plan to deliver to delete the deadline have
587 plans to be made under the plan; and

588 **[PHONE RINGING]**

589 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas, while the Town does
590 not generally entertain modifications to payment plans, it is now obligated -

591 **[PHONE RINGING]**

592 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Hold on, give me one second...

593 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas, while the Town does
594 not generally entertain modifications that payment plans, it is now obligated
595 to do so under law due to the extraordinary proceeding circumstances
596 surrounding the economic impact of the COVID 19 pandemic and the fact
597 that action has been taken out the federal, state, and county level to
598 eliminate or substantially reduce the burden on the taxpayers to pay
599 income and real property taxes until July 15, 2020, the Town Board
600 believes it is appropriate and warranted in this situation to provide the
601 property owner with relief in line with that provided at the higher levels of
602 government; and

603 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Now therefore be it resolved
604 upon the owner of 108 Croton Avenue submitting a signed hardship
605 certification in the form provided by the town based upon the criteria
606 established by the Westchester County Executive, the Town Board hereby
607 authorizes the Tax Receiver of Taxes Tangent and Amendment Agreement
608 for a payment plan for the delinquent or your property taxes for 108 Croton
609 Avenue which agreement shall make the deadline for the next payment
610 July 15 2020 and subsequent payments shall be made on before the 15th
611 of every month thereafter, until the outstanding obligation has been
612 satisfied; and

613 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Be it further resolved the Town
614 Board is authorizing this action based upon the extraordinary unforeseen
615 circumstances of the COVID-19 pandemic and the actions taken out the
616 federal, state, and county level to alleviate tax board is on taxpayers until
617 July 15 2020 and this authorization shall not establish your person for this
618 property or any other property owners going forward and seeking relief
619 from the delinquent tax plan obligations or general tax obligations; and

620 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Be it further resolved in
621 authorizing the sanction, the Town Board does not waive any rights or
622 remedies available to it under the original payment plan, State law, or local
623 law and hereby expressly reserves the right to take any action or utilize any
624 remedies and enforcement mechanisms available to the Town under the
625 law, anytime in the future.

626 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Loud noises in the background, I had
627 put it on mute. Do I have a motion?

628 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW:** So moved.

629 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Do I have a second?

630 **COUNCILMEMBER LIZ FELDMAN, COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN**
631 **WILCHER:** Second.

632 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay. Thank you. So recently, due to
633 the undue hardship that many property owners are currently facing due to
634 COVID, we have received a few requests from property owners with
635 existing payment plans to allow for an extension of payment under – until
636 July 15 in line with the extensions and state and federal income tax filing
637 deadlines and hardship extensions for payment of town/county taxes that
638 were due April 2020. We've decided to follow suit and authorize amended
639 payment plans to the property owners at 108 Croton Avenue and 34
640 Eastern Avenue suspending payments until July 15 due to hardships, as
641 long as they prove that there is one, that those individuals are currently
642 facing. So I'm going to ask if everybody's in favor and, you know, just take
643 a vote, but then I just want to have one comment before we launch into the
644 next one, Martha. Okay? So, all those in favor?

645 **ALL:** Aye.

646 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Any opposed?

647 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Council Tomm Addona, since this is
648 a very long resolution. Is it possible that we can amend the reading of the
649 second version of - the second one for the next property because we don't
650 have to actually hear the entire thing. It's exactly the same except for the
651 property address basically? I know by the time you figured it out. We
652 probably could have just read the whole thing, but...

653 **MUNICIPAL ATTORNEY CHRISTIE ADDONA:** I think it's fine if you want
654 to just read the title.

655 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** And the resolved?

656 **MUNICIPAL ATTORNEY CHRISTIE ADDONA:** And the resolved clauses.

657 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay, so our Deputy Clerk. Martha,
658 could you see that?

659 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Okay.

660 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay, fantastic.

661 **MUNICIPAL ATTORNEY CHRISTIE ADDONA:** Yeah, thank you. So, be
662 clear, though, we're amending the resolution that's being read the, the
663 actual resolution that the board is going to be adopting is what's written on
664 the agenda and is available on the Clerk's Office and on the website.

665 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Exactly. Thank you.

666 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Amending payment plan for
667 delinquent taxes for 34 Eastern Avenue. Be resolved upon the owner of 34
668 Eastern Avenue submitting a signed hardship certification in the form
669 provided by the Town, based upon the criteria established by the
670 Westchester County Executive, the Town Board hereby authorizes the
671 Town Receiver of Taxes to enter into an amended agreement for payment
672 plans are delinquent real property taxes, 34 Eastern Avenue, which
673 agreement shall make the deadline for the next payment July 15, 2020 and
674 subsequent payments shall be made on or before the 15th of every month.
675 Therefore, thereafter, until the outstanding obligation has been satisfied;
676 and

677 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Be it further resolved the Town
678 Board has authorized the action based upon the extraordinary and
679 unprecedented circumstances, the COVID-19 pandemic and the actions
680 taken other federal, state, and county level to alleviate tax burdens on
681 taxpayers until July 15 2020 and this authorization shall not establish a
682 precedent for this property owner or any other property owners going
683 forward and seeking only from the delinquent tax payment plans obligations
684 or general tax obligations; and

685 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Be it further resolved in
686 authorizing this action, the Town Board does not waive any rights or
687 remedies available to it under the original payment plan, state law or local
688 and hereby expressly reserves the right to take any actually utilize any
689 remedies and enforcement mechanism available to the Town under the law
690 anytime in the future.

691 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Do we have a motion?

692 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW:** So moved.

693 **COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER, COUNCILMEMBER LIZ**
694 **FELDMAN:** Second.

695 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Any discussion? All those in favor?

696 **ALL:** Aye.

697 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Any opposed. Okay. Any abstain?
698 Thank you.

699 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** And then extension of approval
700 for provisional 2020 Cabaret license. Maya Riviera Bar and Restaurant,
701 518 North State Road Briarcliff Manor.

702 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas Maya Riviera Bar and
703 Restaurant, the applicant, filed an application for a cabaret license for the
704 calendar year 2020, requesting extended hours during which the applicant
705 can play amplified music - and amplified music on Sundays through
706 Thursday from 11pm to 1am and whereas by resolution adopt in March 10
707 2020, the Town Board under its authority pursuant to Chapter 60 to the
708 Town Code Section 16-20(b) to extend hours the cabaret may play
709 amplified music beyond what is permitted in the code where it deems it
710 appropriately consistent with the public safety and welfare granted the
711 applicant a provisional Cabaret temporary license with the requested
712 extended hours for three months and director for public hearing be held on
713 May 26 2020 to give the town board an opportunity to evaluate whether
714 and whether there were any adverse impacts form the extended hours
715 before determining whether the grant whether to grant cabaret license with
716 the extended hours for the entirety of the 2020 calendar year; and

717 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas less than one week
718 later, Governor Cuomo issued Executive Order to 202.3 related to the
719 continuing COVID-19 pandemic directing them all restaurants and bars on
720 premise operations effective at 8pm on March 16, 2020; and

721 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Whereas as a purpose of the
722 provisional license and the scheduling of the May 26, 2020 public hearing
723 was to assess the applicants operation with the extended hours and due to

724 Executive Order 202.3 the applicant has been closed to on-premise
725 operations and pulling playing and providing music from the vast majority of
726 the three month period, the Board finds that it will not be productive to hold
727 the public hearing or making final determination on whether to allow the
728 extended hours the entirety of 2020 at this time; and

729 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** now - and now, therefore, be it
730 resolved the Town Board of the Town of Ossining hereby extends until
731 August 25, 2020 the provisional license subject to all the terms and
732 conditions set forth in the March 10 2020 resolution; and

733 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Be it further resolved the Town
734 Board and hold a public sharing at its August 11, 2020 meeting to assess
735 whether to approve this license in its current form for the entirety of 2020 or
736 make changes to hours, and applicants is authorized to play amplified
737 music on Sunday through Thursdays if the Town Board deems that
738 appropriate based upon the information received at the public hearing; and

739 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Be it further resolved the Town
740 Board reserves the right to amend the above data for as appropriate under
741 the circumstances, based upon the applicant's ability to operate in the end,
742 and down.

743 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Do I have a motion? Thank you.

744 **COUNCILMEMBER ELIZABETH FEDMAN, COUNCILMEMBER**
745 **NORTHERN WILCHER:** So moved.

746 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW:** Second.

747 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Okay, wonderful. So if you can
748 remember any time before quarantine, which feels like a lifetime ago at this
749 point, we had approved a provisional Cabaret license at our March 10
750 meeting for Maya Riviera for a period of 90 days to evaluate the impact of
751 the request for extended hours of operation. Given that Maya Riviera has
752 been unable to operate for just about the entire 90 day period, we will be
753 extending this provisional approval until August - we may have to extend it
754 again if they still haven't had any opportunity to operate - to allow for
755 sufficient review Council Addona. Do you want to elaborate on this or you
756 think we had covered it all?

757 **MUNICIPAL ATTORNEY CHRISTIE ADDONA:** I think the resolution pretty
758 much laid it all out. The Board has done this in the past, and specifically
759 with this applicant, as the resolution stated the code does give the Town
760 board authority to extend the hours where amplified music can be played
761 when appropriate. The Town Board did grant it to the specific applicant for
762 Fridays and Saturdays. In the past, and did it on the same concept of a
763 provisional license, so that they could revisit it there weren't any issues in
764 that instance and there hasn't really been any issues with this applicant as
765 far as we can tell from the building department in the police department
766 which are notified and respond when Cabaret when Cabaret license
767 applications come in. So the Board did granted provisionally, but obviously,
768 given that they haven't been able to operate there's no way for this Board
769 to really assess what impacts, if any, there would be from having the - the
770 Amplified music during the extended hours on the other days of the week.
771 So it just makes sense from a practical perspective.

772 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** All right, any discussion? Did we
773 already have motion and second, yes, I think so. All those in favor?

774 **ALL:** Aye.

775 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Any opposed? All right. Thank you
776 very much.

777 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Next up there's correspondence
778 received and filed. We have none. So monthly reports?

779 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA:** Resolve the Town Board of the
780 Ton of Ossining hereby accepts the following monthly report for the month
781 of April 2020 Dale Cemetery and Town supervisor.

782 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Do I have a motion?

783 **COUNCILMEMBER ELIZABETH FEDMAN:** So moved.

784 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW, COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN**
785 **WILCHER:** Second

786 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** All those in favor?

787 **ALL:** Aye.

788 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG:** Any opposed? All right so off to
789 visitor recognition. Is there anybody in here who would like to comment on
790 anything at all? We have your regular four minutes, starting whenever you
791 get off mute. Anybody interested in seeing anything? Okay. Oh, no – See
792 things shifting around but Victoria? Hearing none, I would like to take a

794 advice of counsel.
