- 1 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG**: Welcome everybody, good evening.
- 2 Please welcome to the Town Board of the Town of Ossining regular
- meeting for Tuesday, June 9 2020 please rise and join me for the Pledge of
- 4 Allegiance.
- 5 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG**: With our virtual flag.
- 6 **ALL**: I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to
- the Republic for which it stands, one nation, under God, indivisible, with
- 8 liberty and justice for all.
- 9 SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: And per the Governor, our flag
- remains at half-staff to recognize all we have lost to the Coronavirus. Okay,
- so I am going to wait for the roll call first.
- 12 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA**: Okay. Councilmember
- 13 Feldman?
- 14 COUNCILMEMBER LIZ FELDMAN: Present.
- 15 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA**: Councilmember Shaw?
- 16 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW**: Present.
- 17 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA**: Councilmember Meyer.
- 18 **COUNCILMEMBER GREG MEYER**: Present.

- 19 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA**: Councilmember Wilcher?
- 20 COUNCILMEMBER NORTHERN WILCHER: Present.
- 21 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA**: Supervisor Levenberg?
- 22 SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Me behind the... I don't know what...
- 23 all the sun rays that are coming through. I can't get rid of them sorry.
- 24 **COUNCILMEMBER LIZ FELDMAN**: You sparkle.
- SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Okay, so we're going to start with
- some announcements, I have a few. First of all, I wanted to share how
- 27 proud I am of the Ossining Community following several peaceful forums
- and protest, which were organized by our local chapter in Ossining, our
- 29 current Ossining High School students, as well as recent high school
- graduates. A few of our Town Board members and I were able to join these
- gatherings and I was left so inspired by the members of our own
- community young and old alike, who are truly dedicated to change. This is
- certainly been a difficult time since the murder of George Floyd in
- Minneapolis, but also a time of deep reflection and exploration of how we
- can all do better to be anti-racist. Last Friday, we held a meeting with our
- Community Equity Task Force to engage community members and
- stakeholders on this important topic. This group started several months ago
- in response to symbols of hate that had appeared in our own community
- and offer to expand community education on how to combat hate and hate
- symbols within our Ossining borders and beyond. We knew following the
- renewed call for change, across the country, It now was an important time
- to gather expand beyond our initial small group of stakeholders and
- reassess our mission. The first step of course is to listen to one another
- and understand the experiences of others. This group also discussed ways
- that we can work to dismantle systemic racism within our own institutions,
- educate the broader Ossining community about institutional racism,
- advocate against racism, ally with those may be different from us and also
- those who are the same of us with us of many different ways, and also,
- who are members of this effort towards unit unity. We think Jalay Knowles
- for those important goals and concepts, also April Clark, who newly moved
- to Ossining shared the importance of acknowledging feelings, helping to
- 52 gain access for those underrepresented, and making our work inclusive
- and visible. Finally, thanks to standing McAllister of the NAACP, for

reminding us how important it is to engage our community elders who can 54 share their first hand experiences and mentor, all of us to make sure we do 55 not repeat mistakes of the past. We thank the community members both 56 new and more seasoned, representatives from - from the Ossining school 57 district and public library, Ossining NAACP, recent Ossining high school 58 graduates, our Chief of Police, and more for joining us for this meeting. 59 This is just the beginning. And we look forward to sharing this mission out 60 with the entire community soon. If you're interested in getting involved, 61 please do not hesitate to contact me at dlevenberg@townofossining.com. 62 This evening the Village have - hosted a village hall to also address the 63 issues of racism, with some of our young leaders, including Jalay Knowles 64 and Catherine Boozang-Hill who are both Ossining high school graduates 65 and are also both teach - I think they were both teachers or teaching 66 assistants at Roosevelt School right now. And they also shared, I think it's 67 OssiningsVoice@gmail.com. I thought I'd written it down but I guess I 68 didn't. No, I think I did. But I'm going to find it find it. Yes, it's 69 OssiningsVoice@gmail.com to get involved with the youth led initiative and 70 Village also shared information about the Youth Bureau that will is going to 71 be coming to Ossining the first new youth bureau in the county and I think 72 they said 30 years and that's going to be another avenue through which we 73 can build new young leaders and work for change. So I'm excited to be part 74 of that, and I hope that all of our community will continue to work together 75 as we need to do to dismantle racism throughout all of our institutions and 76 wherever we have control and influence. And speaking of influence there's 77 also been a call across the state for the State Legislature to repeal 50A of 78 the Civil Rights Law Upstate New York, which restricts public access to 79 misconduct and disciplinary records of police officers. It's clear that 80 misconduct of police across the state has long been kept in the shadows 81 and out of the public eye. This is really, really bad light so, I'm sorry. Yeah, 82 that's better. Oh, that is better. Okay, let's try that and - and making these 83 records public will help ensure accountability for all police officers across 84 New York State, so later in this meeting, this evening, my Town Board 85 colleagues and I will be considering a resolution that will support the 86 current legislation on the table in Albany calling for the immediate repeal of 87 50A. I look forward to supporting this resolution and doing what I can to 88 advocate for change as a member of this local community and I hope my 89 Town Board colleagues will join me as well. This is probably very shaky. So 90

l'm going to see if I can do this in a better way. [UNCLEAR] Exactly. We'll

92 keep going in this direction.

SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Okay, we're now officially in Phase 93 Two of the reopening of the mid-Hudson region, which includes 94 Westchester, Rockland, Dutchess, Orange, Putnam, Sullivan and Ulster 95 counties. And that is as of today, June 9 2020. Phase Two brings the 96 addition of the following industries allowed to reopen: offices, real estate, 97 essential, and also in store retail, vehicle sales, leases, and rentals, retail 98 rental repair - I'm sorry: retail, rental, repair, and cleaning, commercial 99 building management, hair salons, and barbershops. Not nail salons that 100 was removed it was supposed to be - it was in there, initially and then taken 101 out... Sorry, my nails are horrible. I'm sure yours are too - and outdoor and 102 takeout delivery food services. Please know that indoor malls, indoor on-103 premises dining and bar service, large gathering and event venues, gyms 104 fitness centers and exercise classes, video lottery casino gaming facilities, 105 movie theaters, and places a public amusement remain closed at this time. 106 Businesses in these industries that are permitted to reopen in Phase Two 107 must develop a written business safety plan and read and affirm industry 108 specific guidelines prior to reopening. Essential businesses must also 109 develop a written business safety plan. The business safety plan does not 110 have to be submitted to a state agency for approval, but it must be posted 111 conspicuously on the premises of the business and made available to New 112 York State Department of Health, or local health or safety authorities upon 113 inspection. The businesses must also adhere to specific industry guidelines 114 established by the state. Industry specific guidance for Phase Two and 115 template safety plans which you still have to go through and make sure that 116 you have everything in them ready for your place of business are available 117 online@forward.nyc.gov. Phase three can also get a peek at specific 118 guidelines for their industries and begin planning. [SUN GLARE ON 119 SCREEN] Okay, I give up. Sorry. Sorry folks just really that bugs me. What 120 can I do? Okay... The Town of Ossining is developing a permit process by 121 which eating and drinking establishments in the Unincorporated Town can 122 temporarily expand their operations to include outdoor dining, in 123 accordance with Phase Two guidance. This process is currently under 124 review as it would require action by the Town that must be authorized by 125 the State Department of Health. If authorized by DOH, the Building 126

Department will be administrate this permit and if you want to learn more. 127

SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Governor Cuomo has continued to 132 be quite active with issuing executive orders over the weekend and earlier 133 this week. Some that impact our day to day lives more than others. Over 134 the weekend, he issued an Executive Order specific to the school board 135 and budget elections, which in our case in Ossining is also the library 136 board. Over the - as a reminder, there is no in-person voting allowed this 137 year instead all qualified voters should have received that directly in the 138 mail for the school district they are located within. I know, as of today, I'm I 139 heard that somebody did not receive that ballot. So you need to call the 140 school districts. And the reason is previously, all those ballots were due in 141 by today, but over the weekend, the governor extended the date that they 142 can be received by mail. So the school had actually set out a locked drop 143 box outside the building up 400 Executive - or inside the building at 400 144 Executive Boulevard - that was available for dropping off your ballot 145 yesterday and today by five o'clock today. If you didn't get it there by five 146 o'clock today, you can still get it in the mail and as long as it is received -147 not postmarked but received - by June 16 at 5pm the school district is then 148 and only then authorized - and the library, well, the school district opens the 149 ballots for the library, but this is also true for Briarcliff - is then allowed to 150 open the ballots. So if you have not received a ballot, please reach out to 151 the district clerk in Ossining that's Ileana Ortiz to us at 152 iortiz@ossiningUFSD.org or the Briarcliff school district clerk at 914-432-153 8130. This is the 11th hour at this point, but you still do have time to fill out 154 your ballots and put them in the mail and cross your fingers that the United 155 States Postal Service will get it there on time. We are also planning for a 156 mostly absentee ballot primary election on June 23 however in person early 157 voting and Election Day voting will be allowed for the June 23 primary and 158 that is all on this paper which I am going to tell you now. Basically it is June 159 - Saturday and Sunday June 13 and 14th, you will be able to vote from 12 160 to five. Monday, June 15 from eight to four. Tuesday, June 16 from 12 noon 161 to 8pm. Wednesday, June 17 at 8am to 4pm. Thursday, June 18th, 12 to

- eight. Thursday, Friday, June 19 eight to four, and then Saturday and
- Sunday, June 20 and 21st twelve to five. So there's lots of different times,
- hard to remember, I agree.
- SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: The clerk's office in the town of
- Ossining is going to have all this information and we will post it on our
- website at TownofOssining.com as well. And 'where is everybody going to
- vote' you ask, well that's going to be at the Ossining Community Center. So
- 170 I feel like I skipped something... I did. Um... I don't know where it went off
- to... But... Okay...So, you will be able to vote at the Ossining Community
- 172 Center for if you're in Ossining Town of Ossining any, any place in the
- 173 Town of Ossining, you can vote at the Ossining Community Center. And
- that's 95 Broadway in Ossining. So voters will be able to enter through the
- front door of the Community Center where there will be a greeter who will
- ensure only people wearing a mask are allowed to enter you will be given
- your own pants to use for voting to be disposed of after voting. I'm sure you
- can keep your pen if you really want to, and you will then be directed to the
- art room or voting will occur. Gloves and hand sanitizer will also be
- available. You will then be asked to leave through the museum exit door to
- create a one way in one way out path for voters. For voting on June 23rd,
- registered voters who have not yet voted the absentee ballot will receive a
- notice in the mail directing them to vote at one of two polling places that will
- be open that day: the community center or Roosevelt Elementary school on
- 185 Croton Avenue. You will be required to go to your assigned polling place.
- Voting will be open from 6am to 9pm as usual and similar protocols (that
- one way in one way out) will be in place with a greeter as early same as
- early voting. Please note absentee ballots are still being processed and
- mailed out to if you haven't received your absentee ballot in the mail yet do
- not panic. If you submitted an application and have not yet received your
- ballot, it will likely be on its way shortly. You if you choose to vote
- absentee or if you chose to your ballot must be postmarked by June 23 -
- that's the ballot, not the application the application I actually don't have
- the date for when it needed to be postmarked by... Victoria?
- 195 **BUDGET OFFICER VICTORIA CAFARELLI**: June 16.
- SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: June 16, which is coming up, but you
- still have a chance to send in your absentee ballot application, which you

- should have received in the mail everybody in New York State should
- have received one in mail. You can still fill out your application for an
- absentee ballot and if you get it back hopefully you'll get it back in time so
- that you can vote by June 23 have it postmarked by then and have it on
- its way back. You may also have seen that Governor Cuomo issued an
- 203 Executive Order over the weekend relating to municipal operations since
- March 16 all non-essential Town Staff have primarily been working
- remotely or taking turns, so very few people in our offices. However, as I
- 206 hope you have all experienced, all of our offices with the exception of the
- Justice Court, have remained fully operational. We're just starting to get
- information today about how our Justice Court is going to come back online
- soon. So we've been able to process paperwork answer phones, mail has
- been received and been sent from our offices. According to an executive
- order issued this weekend Municipal Operations may resume at full staff as
- of Tuesday, June 29 as long as all of the Phases happen according to plan
- 213 and we don't have to take any steps back because we need to wait two
- weeks after we have been in phase... Well after we've been in...
- 215 MUNICIPAL ATTORNEY CHRISTIE ADDONA: The 23rd. After June 23.
- SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Right, no I have June 23rd but it says
- two weeks after we've been Phase Two for two weeks. No after we've been
- in Phase Two for two weeks. Got it.
- MUNICIPAL ATTORNEY CHRISTIE ADDONA: After two weeks after
- Phase 2 starts. So essentially, in theory, we would get to Phase Three if we
- continue on this path.
- 222 SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Correct.
- 223 MUNICIPAL ATTORNEY CHRISTIE ADDONA: But it doesn't say "Phase
- Three" it said two weeks after Phase Two.
- SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Right. So again, presuming that
- everything is okay and we don't go backwards and our numbers don't start
- to rise, which so far, they've been looking very good. So we're closely
- evaluating how best to increase our in person workforce in accordance with
- this change in policy always looking to balance the safety of our employees
- with the needs of our constituents. As reminder offices remain closed to the
- public and will likely remain so for the next several weeks, but there are

opportunities to make appointments, if we need to, we will come meet you 232 outside. We've been doing - excuse me - a lot of things to meet people 233 where they are at, if need be, but we have not invited people back into the 234 office yet. However, I did see some excellent work, thanks to the Village of 235 Ossining Public Works Department and their - and also, our - their Human 236 Resources, they've already started suiting up the building the Armory 237 Building so that when we are back up and running for the public there are 238 now plexiglass screens on all of the counters in the Building Department in 239 the Town and in the Village and in the DPW offices. So that's looking really 240 great and they're going to be moving to 16 Croton next, and really doing 241 their best to outfit, the first floor. And we're going to do um - also be 242 focusing on keeping as much business as possible on the first floor. 243 Instead of having people travel throughout the building until we really know 244 that we have a handle on this virus, and I'm going to say until there's a 245 vaccine in place, because I can't imagine why else we would change our 246 routines before that, but we will see. One more note on reopening, the 247 Town has partnered with the Greater Ossining Chamber of Commerce to 248 create an Economic Recovery Task Force specifically for the North State 249 Road businesses and other businesses located in the Unincorporated 250 Town. We would like to invite all business owners in our neck of the woods, 251 please consider joining this important discussion. There's a link to a short 252 Google form on our website if you're interested in joining. Or you can just 253 shoot me an email at dlevenberg@townofosining.com and I will gladly and 254 point you in the right direction. 255

SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Finally, you know what I'm going to talk about everybody. I once again will remind you to please fill out your 2020 census because, just so you don't have to hear from me anymore about this. Believe it or not, it was 89 days ago, March 12, that the first Census 2020 materials started arriving in our homes. Pretty crazy. Since then, right in the middle of the pandemic across the county, the response rates have continued to inch up at a county-wide rate of 61.7% right now and just 6.2% away from the total county-wide response rate of 2010. I guess that's our goal. I think our goal was to surpass 2010, especially since we all have the time to do this. Here in Unincorporated Town of Ossining we are at 63.1% and I think that leaves us about 6.5% away. It's either 6.2 or 6.5% away from where we left off, where we ended in 2010 which is

- slightly better than the county, but about the same percentage away from 268 where we were in 2010. The Village of Ossining is 58.3% and they're also 269 in that six point a little bit away from their 2010 numbers and the Village of 270 Briarcliff is 76.6%. We can all do a lot better. So come on now people can – 271 fill out your census. Just answer me this - I'm praying that my entire board 272 is filled out their census. Can you please shake your head yes if your 273 census have been [UNCLEAR]. Thank goodness, I don't know, Northern I 274 didn't see your head shaking. Yes, I'm just like 'I don't know. Jesse did it'. 275 Holly Perlowitz, census done? Yeah, okay, Martha? Martha all your 276 census? Okay we – I - I'm not putting you on the spot. Everybody fill out 277 your census. If you haven't done it yet because like my family member 278 didn't - everybody needs to fill out the census. And if you didn't fill out your 279 census fill out your census. Please get your friends and family to fill out the 280 census everybody. Okay, I think I've said enough of that. Field operations 281 for the 2020 census have started to resume, which means that we're going 282 to start seeing people coming, door to door in August if you haven't filled 283 out your census. So if you don't want strangers knocking at your door - and 284 who does, nobody – please fill out your census, then you won't have them 285 come to your door. Okay, it's just, it's just that simple. And we do want to 286 get to 100%. Okay that is enough about that. Do any of my colleagues 287 have any other announcements? I'm going to just say announcements and 288 or liaison reports, because that's up next on the agenda, you can do them 289 all together if you'd like. 290
- 291 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW**: I have a liaison report. The
- Recreation Advisory Board met last night and I know many people are
- chomping at the bit to see if summer camp will go off or not. There hasn't
- really been a consensus yet. We're still waiting for guidance from the State
- as to what they're looking for and what the parameters are for camp so
- before we get that -
- 297 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG**: Yeah.
- 298 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW**: it's kind of hard to create camp.
- SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Those did come out today, just so
- 300 you know.
- 301 COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW: Okay, so -

- 302 SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: It -
- 303 COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW: the meeting -
- 304 SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: yeah -
- 305 **COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW**: was last night.
- 306 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG**: Yes and and and We'll get
- them to Bill Garrison, who's our Parks and Recreation Superintendent, did
- 308 receive them today -
- 309 COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW: Okay.
- 310 SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: because I did check with him.
- 311 COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW: Great, right. So, but some of the
- parameters are I think they have to operate at like 25% capacity. I think that
- was the number that was tossed around so if camp does happen, it's going
- to be very different than what people are used to. One of the consensus
- that we did find is that the Parks and Rec will be doing different kinds of
- programs, whether it's kayaking -So that they're working on some kind of
- programming for the summer. It's just I don't think it'll be camp as we know
- it. So that's where they are right now.
- 319 SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: And thank you for that. I am just
- going to add to that. We're very excited that we through a grant through
- 321 Senator, State Senator Carlucci's Office we were able to purchase a new
- dock for Cedar Lane Pond and I'm mentioning this in the context of
- kayaking, because I know that there has been kayaking before at Cedar
- Lane Pond and hopefully, there might be again as part of the summer
- program. So where we need to get a little bit more direction on that is from
- Bill Garrison. I Bill and I spoke today also about the Spray Park. We are
- still do not have approval to have the Spray Park open, but it is possible we
- can request through the economic... what's... ESD? ESD anybody do you
- 329 remember?
- BUDGET OFFICER VICTORIA CAFARELLI: Empire State Development.
- 331 SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: Empire State Development. They're
- the ones who kind of overseeing the whole re you know New York forward
- plan. We can request possibly that to open the spray Park, even without

the formal guidance and there is, there have been guide guidelines issued 334 by the New York State Parks so... Oh uh Association. So Bill Garrison is 335 going to be looking into that with us. Also bathrooms, as I understand it, are 336 - are supposedly going to be allowed to be open in parks starting June 23rd. 337 We have been very busy working on updating all of the conference stations 338 throughout our parks and we're hoping that we're going to have automatic 339 soaps, automatic flushes in some cases I believe - I'm not 100% sure about 340 the automatic flushes – and automatic paper towel so we don't have to 341 have a lot of high touch areas. It's my understanding that when the 342 bathrooms do open, they will be limited to one person at a time. So we 343 have a lot of signage that we have to get working on to remind people. And 344 a Spray Park would have to have somebody there to manage the number 345 of people and to make sure that people keep a distance. So we are hopeful 346 that we can get it up at some point, probably. I'm going to guess, is early 347 July is going to be the soonest, but that is certainly a goal of ours. And 348 finally, I think Phase Four is when we would be able to open up our ball 349 fields and other place play areas for contact sports. That's in Phase Four 350 so we, again, that's probably going to be early July. If everything again 351 goes according to plan. And we're going to be working on everything that 352 we can do to make sure all of our parks and public spaces are ready for 353 those eventualities. Right now the only other large gatherings. There are 354 allowed our graduation ceremonies outdoors starting... it is June 26th, does 355 that sound right? Sunday June 26 and they're - they're allowed to have 150 356 people all in, that includes every you know staff person from school parents 357 graduates, etc. So I don't know that Ossining's going to change whatever 358 their plan is right now. I think they're doing graduation today, tomorrow, the 359 next day. And they're having kids walking across the stage receiving their 360 diplomas are videotaping everything and then they're going to have a 361 parade. I want to say, and some kind of and then hopefully it find a place to 362 me to show the video, um, June – I want to say June 19th and 20th, is that 363 time right? Anybody a school district mama? Jackie Shaw, I'm gonna ask 364 you. 365

COUNCILMEMBER JACKIE SHAW: That does sound right -

366

SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: I think – Yes, I think that's approximately right. So the School District is doing their best also to find some are opportunities for our children. Parks are going to be doing their

- best. Part of the problem is: if it isn't camp, then it's recreation and it doesn't
- start until Phase Four, which again is pretty probably pretty close to one
- camp normally have started anyway, just maybe, maybe a week late. And
- so anyway, working hard, thank you for all the work from the Recreation
- Advisory Board. Continuing with my colleagues, does anybody else have
- any announcements? Or if even if you had any questions about my
- announcements, feel free. Otherwise, we gonna launch into our meeting.

- 392 **SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG**: Anybody opposed? Okay.
- 393 **DEPUTY CLERK MARTHA QUITUISACA**: Approval voucher detail report
- Resolve the Town Board of the Town of Ossining and hereby approves the
- voucher detail report dated June 9 2020 in the amount of \$299,673 and 19
- 396 cents.

- Bailey 82513 O'Donnell Bill to repeal Section 50A of the Civil Rights Law,
- whereas the recent murders of George Floyd, Tony McDade, and Brianna
- Taylor and unfortunately many other black people at the hands of the police
- 556 have brought strong cause from the community for government leaders to

chase transformative actions to address systematic racism which has 557 pervaded our country for too long, and whereas section 50A of the civil 558 rights law relating to the personnel records of police officers, firefighters, 559 and correction officers currently prevents the misconduct and disciplinary 560 records of frustration being made public allowing for abusive officers to 561 continue to access impunity and whereas there is a bill currently under 562 consideration, by the New York State Senate and Assembly as 3695 Bailey 563 slash 82513 O'Donnell to immediately repeal section 50A of the civil rights 564 law finally bring into my records which will hopefully lead to better 565 accountability of police across New York State. Now, therefore, be it 566 resolved that the Town Board of the Town of Ossining hereby expresses its 567 support for New York State Senate and Assembly Bill as 3695 Bailey 568 82513 O'Donnell, which would immediately repeal Section 50A of the civil 569 rights law. Finally, allowing the misconduct and disciplining records of 570 police officers to be made public and urges members of the New York 571 State Senate in assembly to lead during this important time and taking 572 whatever legislative actions. May be necessary to dismantle systematic 573 racism and State of New York and vs further resolved. But this resolution 574 be circulated to New York State Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-575 Cousins, New York State Assembly Speaker [UNCLEAR], New York State 576 Senator David Carlucci in New York State Assemblywoman Sandy Galef 577 stating the support of the town board of the town of Ossining for this 578 necessary legislation. 579

- SUPERVISOR DANA LEVENBERG: And also to the sponsors, you can ask those on friendly amendment. Thank you. So, can I have a motion?

- rug and out of the public eye. Now is the time to call for change. And
- through this resolution, the town board asserts our support of
- transformative change on a more broad State level. I look forward to
- catching my 'Aye' or 'Aaye' in support of this important legislation. Is, are

- there's a lot more steps to go.

- inside or knowledge counts with higher is an early voting on this this tonight
- in the Senate, or is it already done deal?

- actually [UNCLEAR] the Senate today, so we're good there. I think the
- 606 assembly is doing it tonight.

- you might have for assembly, Assembly member, and Senator and
- 609 hopefully they will have it at least in front of them and know that we have
- supported it. Anybody else? Councilman Wilcher? Councilwoman Shaw?
