- Dana Levenberg: Perfect timing everybody. Thank you very much. We are
- 14 off to our role call.
- 15 Martha Quituisaca: Councilmember Feldman?
- Sue Donnelly: [She's] just signing in.
- 17 Martha Quituisaca: I'll go back to her. Councilmember Shaw?
- 18 Jackie Shaw: Present.

- Dana Levenberg: We're here. Okay, so we are going to get started with
- 28 some announcements.
- 29 Liz Feldman: I hear you...
- Dana Levenberg: Can or cannot? Can you hear me?
- Liz Feldman: I'm calling in on my phone. I'm having a problem with my
- 32 um...
- 33 Sue Donnelly: Did you have a blackout? Did you have a little mini blackout.
- 34 Liz Feldman: ...internet.
- Dana Levenberg: We all had a mini blackout.
- 36 Liz Feldman: Ah.
- Dana Levenberg: Uh, so you may want to just reset it maybe you lost the
- wifi or something like that.
- Liz Feldman: Yeah, but I'm gonna go out and come right back.
- Dana Levenberg: Okie doke. All right. I'll start with my announcements I
- don't think you're gonna miss that much. Okay, okay so... We are off to a
- wintry start this week, some people say 'let it snow, let it snow, let it snow'
- and 'I say let it stop snowing.' But thank you to our Highway and Parks
- crew, who spent most of super bowl Sunday salty and plowing the roads
- l'm not even sure that they actually made it back in time for kickoff but
- fingers crossed a few of them did. Then, of course, they were out again
- today. I actually think the snow the snow started a little earlier than

anybody expected this morning. This week's - this week's storm at least 48 five inches to the piles we already had built up last week and it looks like 49 another round may already be on its way. Just as a reminder, if you have a 50 sidewalk you need to shovel it in front of your home also please remember 51 to shovel out any nearby fire hydrants if they are still covered in snow. 52 During an emergency every second counts and no one wants to lose time 53 digging out of frozen hydrant. Regardless of whether we get more snow 54 this week temperatures are expected to be very low so be prepared, dress 55 warmly, and stay safe. The vaccine rollout continues to be very slow. The 56 current demand for vaccines largely outweighs the current supply. We are 57 hearing concerns about access to the vaccine from our residents and will 58 continue to work with county and State Representatives to make sure that 59 Ossining residents have access to the vaccine. I know that we heard a lot 60 from our County Executive, the other day that it's, you know, just a 61 distribution issue at this point and we are beholden to the State, so when 62 we get the vaccine we'll do whatever we can to help get it out. 63

A program that had been launched in Greenberg to help seniors navigate 64 the vaccine registration website to schedule appointments was brought to 65 our attention and we are looking to create a similar program in Ossining for 66 seniors and essential workers to help ease the stress of this complicated 67 process. Volunteers interested in helping seniors can reach out to my office 68 at dlevenberg@townofossining.com. One challenge of this program will be 69 to help deter scams targeting vulnerable populations. Vaccines are free to 70 all residents and you cannot pay to hold your place in line. Residents are 71 encouraged to report vaccine fraud or abuse to the State hotline at 1-833-72 VAX – which is V-A-X - scam – S-C-A-M. So those are the letters for the 73 numbers. 74

Tests are still readily available in Ossining. Star of Bethlehem Church is 75 offering tests on Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 9am to 8pm -76 that's COVID tests obviously. Testing is also available at Open Door, CVS, 77 and other sites. You can call them directly or use the test finder feature 78 'Find a Test Site Near You' on the New York state website. If you attended 79 a Super Bowl party, please get tested, even if you have no symptoms. Give 80 yourself peace of mind and rule out the chance that you are an 81 asymptomatic spreader. Vaccines racing to end the pandemic, but the 82 83

more contingent contagious strains are gaining ground. So wear your mask

- even two wash your hands, and get tested if you're interacting with
 people outside your household. OVAC is also administrator rapid tests by
 appointment go to their Facebook page to get instructions about signing up.

- grow, so they're they keep adding more and more to it and it's really
- 98 fantastic so it's definitely worth visiting and revisiting.

- conversation Ossining is black History also, next Thursday at 6pm. Tune
- tune in to learn about Ossining's prominent business owners, women
- leaders, and those who are employed by Sing Sing Prison. You can

- In recent Supervisors Updates I had been sharing some local job
- opportunities. We recently learned that Westchester county will be holding

- obviously, that means that they're hoping they're anticipating that they
- may have jobs open their the summer, which would be great visit the virtual

- positions available everything from ride operators to lifeguards and submit
- 114 your application online qualified candidates will be contacted to schedule
- virtual interviews on Saturday February 20 and Sunday February 21st.
- Finally, I would like to take a moment to address an email that has been
- circulated on social media that I sent to members of the town and village
- boards and a few staff members in July. In a community as diverse as ours,

it is of utmost importance to make every decision with an eye towards 119 equity. If the way that I phrased that sentiment in the letter made it look like 120 I meant anything less, I - I sincerely apologize, because it was certainly not 121 my intention. And I did post on my Ossining Supervisor Dana Levenberg 122 Facebook page, with the full explanation of that and you're welcome to 123 read that but I'll just continue to share a little bit about that which, basically, 124 is that the this year was challenging in many ways, including the 125 maintenance and operation of our town parks, as they were being utilized 126 in numbers we had never seen before. With more people come quality of 127 life concerns like increase garbage and relaxed attitude towards covert 128 safety protocols. Also, Governor Cuomo was issuing executive orders 129 almost daily limiting the size of gatherings and other group activities. We 130 were faced with a challenging task, creating welcome spaces for people to 131 get outdoors, while following executive orders and keeping people safe. 132 During the summer of 2020 we also experienced a renewed National 133 Movement to address systemic racism in law enforcement. Many in the 134 Community, including some elected officials were calling on the town to 135 deploy police into the parks to monitor park users and issue tickets for non-136 compliance. In a diverse community and in the spirit of the very valid 137 nationwide concerns regarding traditional policing, I felt this was not a 138 responsible solution, one that could likely make the situation worse, not 139 better. Instead, I wrote the email that is now circulating on social media 140 offering a variety of alternatives, the town could employ to address these 141 quality of life concerns: employing more park attendants, bringing in 142 lifeguards for the spray park, purchasing more garbage cans, and public 143 messaging. I believe these alternatives to policing were better uses of 144 taxpayer dollars and achieved our goal of fostering welcome spaces for all 145 to enjoy while addressing the safety of our residents during a pandemic. 146 This situation has reminded me that we have a lot of hard work ahead of us 147 as a society to strive to be anti-racist and attempt to right generations of 148 injustice. I resolve to always try to do better, work harder, and evaluate 149 policy decisions through the lens of equity with great respect for our 150 beautiful wonderful diverse Ossining. 151 Do any of my other board members want to share any comments or 152

announcements?

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Jackie Shaw: I have a couple of comments on this actually. I'm not on 154 Facebook and - and a couple of people have contacted me, so I have a gist 155 of what's being said about you Dana on Facebook and it's one of the 156 reasons I'm not on Facebook actually. So my recollection of this whole 157 thing was we were getting a lot of complaints from community members 158 about the parks, particularly about garbage, things like loud music, issues 159 like that. The Village [of Ossining] was also getting its share of complaints 160 and the Village [of Ossining] kind of came to us and said we should have a 161 - a cohesive plan going forward, because most people don't know if they're 162 163 in a village or town park. And, and the villages side of it was that we should do more police enforcement, we should be handing out tickets. And I had a 164 lot of concerns about that, when I had been at Engel Park, not only was I 165 seeing more people at the park, but I was seeing more people of color at 166 the park. And, at a time when there was all this all social unrest, there were 167 all these issues with the police. And at a time when we were as a 168 community examining equity in Ossining, I did not think that police - more 169 police enforcement ticketing people suddenly when there were more 170 people of color at the park was the way to go. And we had a discussion, I 171 had a discussion with you Dana on this. And we agreed on this, so your 172 thoughts were to come up with solutions that didn't involve the police, didn't 173 174 involve enforcement, and you gave some of the suggestions in your announcements. So to take that into twisted into negatively against you, I 175 think it's really disrespectful. And - and it's one of the reasons I'm not on 176 Facebook, because it's taken out of context and then it just takes on a 177 whole life of its own, and it has no actual truth or fact. The whole goal and 178 your goal and the Town's goal as well as the Village's goal is always to 179 make the parks safe, accessible, and welcoming. And police enforcement 180 was not going to be the way to go, particularly in the environment we were 181 in in the summer and we are in now. And I still think that your solutions and 182 your strategies were the better way to go. 183

Dana Levenberg: Thank you. Anybody else have anything else, they want to add or share? Any other announcements? Okie doke, alright, well in that case let's launch into our meeting. Thank you so much Councilman Shaw. I really appreciate it, I appreciate your support. Okay, so let me just see up next, I think we have a wonderful departmental report from Honorable Suzanne Donnelly, our Town Clerk and Village Clerk.

Sue Donnelly: Correct. Thank you very much, thank you for having me 190 Supervisor and Councilmembers. It's always a joy to come here and - and 191 Martha will be continuing on the meeting with you and so I'm just going to 192 give the report on the Clerk's department. Tell me if you can't hear me 193 because sometimes my machine goes type slightly bonkers. The Clerk's 194 office and responsibility have changed over the past years in small ways as 195 well as large ways. We continue to follow marion's focus of customer 196 service will understanding our role of doing the right thing for the majority of 197 the constituents. The major change is the fact that our commitment was to 198 move many licenses and permits online as soon as possible, which was 199 accomplished, believe it or not, with the help of the pandemic. Yes, we 200 have manned the Office every day, through the pandemic and, yes, we 201 have upgraded our systems as needed, so we could and can continue to 202 work from home to react to the increase request for death certificates 203 during these very trying times. 204

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We have moved such request is birth marriage and death certificate records online, which are audited paid for through seamless doc's, a program we were introduced to by other communities as well as a very supportive sales staff who allowed us to test drive the product by using marriage license requests online. We have successfully issued over 250 marriage licenses with all a pandemic protocols in place. From dog licenses to cabaret licenses, all residences and business owners have to simply go online either to the Clerk's page or to - to forums at the top of the homepage to see all the licenses and permits, you can complete and pay online and choose to come into the office or have us mail you the copies you need. People need these documents for many reasons, some being to receive social security, as well as enhanced driver's license to name a few. With the support of both the town and village boards we purchased the product and instantly began using it mostly thanks to Martha - Martha is a little genius on this program I must give her all credit. It has allowed our office to focus on streamlining the process of filling out applications, as well as tighter control on our licensing. Handicap tags, so the responsibility of the Clerk's office. Should you require a temporary six month permit, or a permanent, which is actually five years tag you must fill out the form from the State of New York and have your doctor complete his or her section. Either bring the form into the office during normal COVID hours - which are

9am to 2:30pm - along with your driver's license or mail the form to the

office with a copy of your driver's license which we will issue you your

handicap tag that will hang from your rear view mirror only when needed.

And of course, only can be used when the handicapped person is in the

vehicle.

231 After major delays, we are now selling hunting and fishing licenses in the

Clerk's office, the State decided to change the software and printer just

before the pandemic hit. It took months before we could get the system

working again well many communities, believe that the pittance that the

local government receives is not worth the effort, needed, we feel it is

important to offer this service to our residents. The Clerk's office has got

electronic filing for about 90% of its documents in 2020. Yes, we are the

keeper of the records and, yes, we have we keep hard copies with original

signed documents and items such as vehicles for the town titles, excuse

me titles for the vehicles of the town, and of course our historical files go

back to the 1800s. Because our files are so extensive and sometimes we

need time to do research to accomplish a request, please be patient with

us, especially if you are asking for historical information. During the

pandemic - pandemic, the only place the public can go in the municipal

building - 16 Croton Avenue - is the Clerk's office on the first floor. We have

opened our offices to other town and village departments in the building, as

well as retrofitting our records room. Together we have concluded Village

248 and School Tax Collection with the Village Finance Office and the Town

249 Tax Receivers.

January was extremely busy month, but with all departments, we made it

work with all hands on deck collecting all the information and taxes they

needed for their departments. When you come into the municipal building

you'll be greeted by one of our staff who will take your temperature and ask

you no more than six questions concerning you and COVID. This is not a

case, certainly not to invade your privacy, but rather to have contact tracing

should it be, should the need arise. If you are uncomfortable with this, we

suggest you call email or even mail your request to the individual

department. We ask your patience, when you are downstairs as we call the

department, you wish to speak to and they send down a representative, we

are all doing our best through these very tough time and ask for your

261 cooperation.

- In 2019 the town received a grant to organize their file retention systems
- 263 and with the help of two great consultants, we have organized about 75%
- of stored files, set up a file system in the John Paul Rodriguez operation
- 265 Center trained to every Department on how to continue to upkeep the
- systems, and put into put up put into place as we move other departments
- on to electronic filing for the future. We have systems in place that ensure
- three sets of backups or may daily. Two are kept in sight and one is always
- kept off site, so we have our redundancy that is required by the State of
- New York.
- Files are the files, excuse me, I wish it was files FOILS are the
- responsibility of the Clerk's office and all requests must be done online. We
- receive over 1250 requests each year from both the town in the village of
- Ossining combined. By using an application, we have from admins we can
- follow the request from when the request comes in, to the response by the
- appropriate department. Please understand that a FOIL is not meant for
- general information, you must ask for specific information. A FOIL request
- will be responded to within five days of receipt of the FOIL and the
- Department has between 10 and 20 days to respond to that request. There
- have been some instances where extensions are requested, as well as
- other instances where the response has almost been immediate.
- 282 As in many of our fellow departments, we are part of shared services
- between the town and village of Ossining. Many of our functions under the
- town and village on excuse me under the Village of Ossining umbrella are
- used by town residents and departments. For example, we have taken over
- the management of taxi services here in Ossining. We spent a Saturday
- with the Ossining police department in our offices office licensing the taxi
- driver inspecting the vehicles and licensing the taxi companies. Please
- 289 refer to our face -
- 290 [SILENCE]
- Martha Quituisaca: Sue you cut out. Sue?
- 292 Dana Levenberg: Uh oh. Sue?
- Sue Donnelly: full vehicle. Oh yep, I'm sorry?
- Dana Levenberg: We lost you. Could go back go back a couple
- paragraphs, for whatever reason you just cut out.

- Sue Donnelly: Oh yeah? Was was I in FOILs yet?
- 297 Martha Quituisaca: Yeah you were -
- Jackie Shaw: Yeah you were talking about taxis.
- Martha Quituisaca: past the FOILs, you were -
- Dana Levenberg: [UNCLEAR] after taxis.
- Sue Donnelly: Oh, we're in the taxis. We're still in taxis. Okay I'll start on
- taxis, again, for example, we have taken over the management of the taxi
- services in Ossining. We spent a Saturday with the Ossining police
- department at our office licensing the taxi drivers, inspecting the vehicles,
- and licensing the companies and licensing companies, please refer to our
- Facebook page or the web page of both the Village and the Town for a list
- of authorized taxi companies in Ossining. It is against the law for a taxi
- company not registered in Ossining to pick up fares in Ossining. We asked
- the police have inspected all vehicles and medallions have been issued if
- they passed. All drivers have their license checked through D DMV by the
- police department and only those with clean driving records are issued taxi
- driver licenses, which must be clearly displayed on the passenger side of
- the dashboard as you enter the cab. So as you get into as you get into the
- cab you should see it where you would see it in New York City on the
- Passenger side of the dashboard.
- Dana Levenberg: Is that true for Uber and Lyft too?
- 317 Sue Donnelly: I'm sorry?
- Dana Levenberg: For like Uber and Lyft. Is that true they don't [UNCLEAR]-
- Sue Donnelly: Uh, no. We not do anything with Uber and Lyft. That is –
- 320 Dana Levenberg: Okay.
- Sue Donnelly: That is, we have no jurisdiction over that -
- 322 Dana Levenberg: Sorry.
- Sue Donnelly: all It's okay. All pandemic questions must be followed any
- compliments or complaints should be addressed to the Clerk's office. You
- can email me at sdonnelly@townofossining.com or call during business

- hours to 914-762-8428, we will see that issues are addressed and that the
- company receives all the compliments, you want to give.
- Other functions of the Clerk's office that affect those who live in the
- unincorporated area, the town, as well as those who live in the Village of
- Ossining and 91% of the Village of Briarcliff Manor: our train station parking
- and muni parking should you work in the Village of Ossining we have we do
- muni parking for them.
- Lastly, we are the switch well it's not 'lastly,' but in this, in this Notice it's
- 'lastly.' Lastly, we are the switchboard and Google for both the town and
- village of Ossining. At least 50% of our calls are for other departments,
- residents looking for information about local government, county
- government, and even state government. We also take care of all US mails
- and packages from any shipping companies. Sorting mail may sound trivial,
- but it is an essential part, it is essential that your correspondence gets to
- the right department, especially if it is time sensitive. Thank you.
- Dana Levenberg: Fantastic. You guys have been busy, and we remember
- you mentioned showing up on a Saturday to help with tax collection and
- making sure there our offices open before the nor'easter and then you
- showed up in the nor'easter as well.
- Sue Donnelly: And during the nor'easter.
- Dana Levenberg: Was today this snowy day was yesterday which was it
- 347 snowing?
- Sue Donnelly: Today was. That today was the icy day it was icy.
- Dana Levenberg: Icy. Right. This morning it was, you know they got they
- got the calls lead, I think, for the roads and they got out late, and it was
- hard and you guys made it in, and it was snowy snowing until I don't know
- what time one o'clock or something like that so. And then it started... So
- thank you. Again, we will –
- Sue Donnelly: We were there. We were there.
- Dana Levenberg: I don't think you had a lot of a lot of people, but thank
- you. Does anybody have any questions for the Clerk's office, since we
- have a lot of our Clerk's Office here tonight? Any questions, compliments,
- you know they take compliments, even if it's, not just for taxis.

- Liz Feldman: I just wanted to thank you all for the hard work that you do.
- Um you've got above and beyond in the endemic you get there, no matter
- what better than the mailman obviously.
- 362 Jackie Shaw: Obviously.
- Liz Feldman: Honestly, and thank you.
- 364 Sue Donnelly: Thank you, thank you.
- Northern: I think you'd be to do you guys have been doing a great job Sue.
- Sue Donnelly: Martha is a big part of it too.
- Northern: I knew you I know you could.
- Greg Meyer: Great thanks for all your hard work, we appreciate it.
- 369 Sue Donnelly: Thank you. Martha's –
- Jackie Shaw: Thank you for all the modernization it couldn't have come at a
- 371 better time.
- Sue Donnelly: If there's there's ever a few silver linings in the
- pandemic and that forcing us to work a lot faster on on modernizing
- certain functions was was one of those silver linings.
- 375 Jackie Shaw: Agreed.
- Martha Quituisaca: Yeah. That was a big chunk of our summer was moving
- all of our forms online.
- Dana Levenberg: Yeah and moving all of your records all over the place
- too, by the way, yes, a lot of a lot of moving. A lot of stuff and making space
- for everybody to work out of that that other office, I mean it's it's really
- been a young woman's job, I would say, a young woman's job.
- Sue Donnelly: It's almost like a dance when it's busy in there. It's almost
- like a dance everybody has their place and everybody just stands there and
- moves everybody along, so it has worked out and the public has been
- extremely cooperative 95% of the time so it's you know. And I understand if
- people don't want to give up their personal information when they walk into
- a building I really don't understand, but I do understand that they don't
- want to simply call and you can send your information, in that you want to

- because we're not forcing anyone into the building, but we are taking all
- cautionary procedures. Because there's there's some of us that have
- been there handling the customers the whole time so the constituents I
- should call them, like customers is from my old world.

- Services, under award 23166, allows all state agencies and political
- subdivisions to purchase or lease new Class 1 through Class 8 vehicles on
- an as needed basis via a competitive Mini-Bid process executed via the
- NYS Vehicle Marketplace during the contract period of November 14
- through November 14, 2019 through November 13, 2029; and
- Whereas, the Town of Ossining is an authorized user in the NYS Vehicle
- Marketplace and has utilized this method to purchase and lease vehicles in
